Spotlight on Stewardship

Preserving land is the first step; caring for it is an ongoing and permanent responsibility.

Under the guidance of D&R Greenway's Director of Stewardship Jim Amon, our stewardship staff and a host of dedicated volunteers monitor and care for 94 D&R Greenway preserves and private properties protected by conservation easement. Stewardship activities include controlling invasive species and restoring native habitat as well as building and maintaining trails to provide people with safe and appropriate access to lands that public funds have helped preserve. Our work on these lands increases their conservation value and contributes to an overall healthier environment. Here are some highlights.

Trail Development

Over 10 miles of trails have been created and maintained throughout our preserves by clearing brush, removing invasive plants, building bridges and walkways and installing signs and markers. Native Plant Nursery

D&R Greenway Site Steward Jared Rosenbaum and volunteers Carol Critchlow and Bill Flemer conceived the vision for D&R Greenway's Native Plant Nursery. This unique undertaking was designed to provide high-quality plants for our preserves, for the conservation community and for homeowners. These plants are propagated from responsibly collected seed and cutting stock indigenous to central New Jersey and are well-adapted for its ecology. Native plants are easy to care for. They will attract and sustain birds, butterflies and other beneficial wildlife and will help create backyard landscapes of harmonious natural beauty.
